RULES

- All dogs to be kept on lead in class unless told otherwise by the Instructor.
- All handlers agree to be responsible for the behavior of their own dog, both ON or OFF lead.
- Children are welcome, but must be under direct parental supervision at all times as they are not covered by insurance.
- Handlers are advised to consult their medical professional regarding tetanus injections.
- Public liability, in case of accidents or incidents, when owning a dog is recommended.
- All members are asked to wear their name badges to class.
- Members are asked to wear appropriate footwear high heels, sandals and thongs are not suitable when training a dog.
- Please remember the NATA Oval is open to the public, so clean up all dog droppings.
- Lessons will start at the advertised times if late, you will miss part of the lesson.
- Be a good club member read the notice board, listen to announcements and practice exercises between weekly lessons.
- Please remember that all Instructors and other workers are volunteers. It will help the club run smoothly if you offer assistance when required.
- A first aid kit is available at the ground. See your Instructor if you require assistance.
- NDTC conducts a risk assessment of the training area and removes any offending material before classes commence. Nata Oval is a drug, alcohol and smoke free area.

FEES for 2019

Annual registration fees are:

\$40 Adult, \$25 Concession/Junior (over 9 and under 18 years), \$60 Family (any combination).

Ground fees for Obedience: \$3.00 per dog per lesson. Agility: \$3.00 per dog per lesson.

Agility and Obedience together: \$5.00 per dog. Rally Training – No charge for registered handlers

FROM THE CHIEF INSTRUCTOR

We have now reached the half-way mark in our training calendar. Competitions have been run in both Agility and Rally Obedience and we will be holding the 1st Handlers Day Obedience Competition on June 22nd, weather permitting.

Those of you who are handlers in the Red and Black Classes who have been attending classes for a while, understand the rules and format of the competitions of which three are held each year. Many of you who have joined the ranks this year will be wondering what 'taking part' means for you, so I will try and explain how the system works.

Three competitions for each discipline are run each year. In the top two classes (red and black) the **Obedience Competition** is scored under Kennel Control Rules, which you can find on the web. The lower classes are scored on the class work that has been taught and practiced each week. Handlers are tested individually as far as is possible, though some exercises i.e. weaving, long sits and downs, are undertaken in a group format. Scores from each of the obedience competitions are added together at the end of the year, and the handler with the highest score is awarded a trophy at the Christmas Party. After each competition the highest scoring handlers in every group are awarded the appropriate ribbon and possibly promoted, though this is not always the case. The same scoring calculation applies to the Agility and Rally O competitions. So it is worth-while to enter all or as many competition days as possible. These days are run to enable us to evaluate the standard of training, whether we need to change any methods, and to enable anyone who may want to take part in official ANKC dog trials (run by other organisations) to be instructed under the correct rules and regulations.

On 22nd of June, when you sign in, you will be given a number to pin on yourself. Proceed into class as normal and whichever Instructor is judging will take it from there. Sometimes, if there are a large number of handlers to be judged, the class will run longer than the usual hour, so if for any important reason you have to leave at 3pm, please tell your judge and they will do their best to arrange the order of judging to accommodate your needs. Or arrive early, and you will receive one of the first numbers to be judged.

If you are still not sure of the system please ask me or any other Instructors who will be glad to help.

Food for thought

Occasionally we have reported to us incidents that have occurred at the NATA Oval during the working week. We have no control over members of the public who exercise their dogs, so the following may help to make sure that you and your friends always stay safe while using the area.

- * Play safe please use common sense in this area
- * Always let other users know you are entering the area
- * Enter with dog on lead and remove lead while dog is sitting
- * Move well away from the gate to avoid crowding
- * Keep moving to minimize tension and scuffles between dogs
- * Stay alert and keep an eye on your dog and others
- * Always reward your dog for coming to you
- * Avoid using balls and other toys if the area is crowded or dogs become too excited
- * Leave immediately if your dog becomes anxious, or is annoying or aggressive towards others
- * Limit your time to 15 minutes, if other handlers are waiting to enter the area
- * Always clean up after your dog
- * Always close the gates behind you



VALE

Narooma Dog Training Club Remembers

Instructors and handlers of NDTC would like to pay tribute to two wonderful dog-loving men, Robert Loftus and Barry Macdonald, both of whom passed away in April.

Vale: Robert Loftus – a great friend and colleague of NDTC's Chief Instructor Yve Robinson, Robert was the driving force behind the establishment of the Batemans Bay Branch. Robert retired to the region from Sydney just a few years ago, yet in that short time managed to establish a dog training branch of AWL NSW, the second only in the state. He was an International Dog Agility Judge in Europe and spent much of his life working for the wellbeing of animals. His expertise as a dog trainer, coupled with his passion for improving the lot of dog owners within his community, were behind the protracted negotiations he undertook with Eurobodalla Shire Council in an effort to establish a dog park in Batemans Bay. NDTC hopes that the work Robert began will continue - we will do what we can to support his vision.

Vale: Barry Macdonald – NDTC remembers with great fondness the visits that Barry made to our branch. A resident of Wagga Wagga and long-serving member of Kyemba Kennel and Training Club, Barry freely gave of his knowledge and expertise to our branch. He had a strong belief in the importance of skill sharing not just within his own community but with other regional dogs clubs, establishing the Country Link Agility Competition in which NDTC has participated for a number of years. In 2007 Barry's own club recognised his momentous contribution and importance by naming their newly erected clubhouse in his honour. As a canine instructor, Barry was a strong advocate of positive reinforcement training. We shall miss him greatly.

Both these men loved their companion dogs and were wonderful role models for responsible pet ownership. NDTC takes great inspiration from them.
