FEES

Annual Registration Fee

Adult	\$40

* Junior handlers must be over the age of 9 years and accompanied by an adult at all times.

* Half-year registration fees are offered from 1 August.

Animal Welfare League

NDTC is a Branch of Animal Welfare League NSW.

If you would like to become a member and support the work of the Animal Welfare League NSW, a separate form and fee is available from the NDTC Secretary.

CLASSES

Classes are conducted every Saturday afternoon, except Public Holiday weekends, weather permitting.

Obedience classes begin at 2pm and finish at 3pm.

Agility for eligible dogs begins at 3.30pm, for one hour, as per the calendar. All participants are required to assist with the setup and pack down of equipment.

Rally Obedience for eligible dogs begins at 3.30pm, for one hour, as per the calendar.

New enrolments in the Beginner/Green Class are accepted every two months. Bookings are essential.

All dogs must be vaccinated. Proof of vaccination is required at the time of registration.

Puppies and Dogs are accepted into Obedience over 3 months, and into Agility over 9 months of age. **All dogs** must complete the Beginner/Green Class **before** taking part in Agility or Rally Obedience.

Handlers Days, and Competitions for Agility and Rally Obedience are held throughout the year, with awards given in both disciplines. **Promotions** may also take place throughout the year. Handlers demonstrating the required standard will be promoted.

Trophies are awarded at the end of each calendar year, at the discretion of the Chief Instructor.

RULES

- * All handlers are responsible for the behaviour of their dog.
- * All dogs must be kept under control at all times, either by their handler or other responsible person.
- * All handlers must wear enclosed footwear (not thongs), suitable clothing and sun protection.
- * All handlers must bring a collar/halter and lead, a small bag of dog treats, and plastic bags for disposal of dog waste to class.
- * **Check chains are not allowed.**
- * All dogs must undergo the Canine Health Check **before** proceeding onto the Nata Oval.
- * All dogs must be on lead from 1.30pm.
- * All handlers should be ready to begin class at 2pm.

Health and Safety

NDTC suggests that all handlers seek medical advice regarding tetanus vaccination. A Risk Assessment of the Nata Oval takes place each week. A First Aid Kit is available on site. Please report any accident or injury to your Instructor. Water and sunscreen are available to all handlers. **Covid Safety Rules** are in place and must be observed.

Be a good handler

Pay attention to announcements, read the notice board, and practice with your dog at home. NDTC Instructors are all experienced dog handlers who volunteer their time and expertise. Please feel free to ask their advice or consult your Vet.
