\* Junior handlers must be over the age of 9 years and accompanied by an adult at all times.

#### Animal Welfare League

NDTC is a Branch of the NSW Animal Welfare League.

If you would like to become a Branch member and support the work that NSTC does on behalf of the NSW Animal Welfare League, a separate form is available from the NDTC Secretary. Note: AWL membership is not included the annual NDTC registration.

## **CLASSES**

**Dog Training** takes place at NATA Oval every Saturday, except Public Holiday long weekends. Weather and health restrictions permitting.

**Obedience** begins at 10am and ends at 11am. **Agility** begins at 11.30am, for one hour, as per the calendar. All participants are required to assist with equipment setup and pack down.

**Rally Obedience** is incorporated into Blue, Yellow, Red and Black classes.

A new Basic Obedience Training Program begins every two months. Bookings are essential. Class size is limited to 12 dogs.

All breeds are accepted into the Basic Obedience Training Program from 3 months of age. All dogs must be vaccinated and micro-chipped. Proof of vaccination is required at time of registration. Dogs must be over 9 months of age to join Agility and have completed the Basic Obedience Training Program before taking part in Agility.

**Obedience Handlers Days,** and **Competitions for Agility** and **Rally Obedience** are held throughout the year, with awards given in all disciplines. **Promotions** may take place throughout the year at the discretion of the Chief Instructor. Handlers demonstrating the required standard will be promoted. **Trophies** are awarded at the end of each calendar year, at the discretion of the Chief Instructor.

## **RULES**

\* All handlers are personally responsible for the behaviour of their dog.

\* All dogs must be kept under control at all times, either by their handler or other designated responsible person.

\* All handlers must wear enclosed footwear (not thongs), suitable clothing, and sun protection.

\* All handers must bring a small bag of dog treats, and plastic bags for disposal of dog waste.

\* Check chains are not allowed.

\* All dogs must be on collar and lead OR haltie and lead from 9.30am.

\* Handlers should arrive in sufficient time to sign in and be ready to begin class at 10am.

#### **Health and Safety**

NDTC suggests that all handlers seek medical advice regarding tetanus vaccination. A Risk Assessment and cleanup of Nata Oval takes place each week. A First Aid Kit is available on site. Please report any accident or injury to your Instructor. Social distancing for **Covid Safety** continues be practiced.

#### Be a Good Handler

Respect your Instructor, pay attention to announcements, and practice what you have learned with your dog at home and on walks. NDTC Instructors are all experienced and knowledgeable dog owners who volunteer their time and expertise to help you bond with your pet. Please feel free to ask their advice. Consult your Vet regarding canine health matters.
